

REFLECTIONS

I do enjoy a good film but, to be honest, I prefer a good book.

If you have a group watching the same film, they are following the same story, with the same characters before their eyes, living out the story line with the same scenery etc.

If you had the same group of people reading the same book, the story would be the same but, because of the pictures in their minds and their imaginations, the characters would all look different and the scenery conjured up by the writer would be different to each reader. Books are so much better for the imagination!

Thousands of years separate us from the writers of the Epistle and Gospel for today, and human understanding about the world and so many other things have changed in that space of time. Now, with 21st century eyes and minds, we read the sometimes strange and yet uplifting things people wrote back then. In recent generations, biblical scholars with knowledge of languages and archeology, to name but two skills, reflect upon what has been handed down to us, and so, when we read, they help us picture what was happening back then. We need their help to enrich our minds and understanding.

Words written by contemporaries of our Lord were people of a different world view, yet also people of faith. The words of Mark, with all its urgency of 'listen and take note' as he speeds through his account of Jesus' life and ministry, and 1 Peter, with words of a new generation of baptised people and a new world in the making, are there to encourage us. Generation after generation have read the same words but with different pictures in their minds, just as a group who meet together for Bible Study will have different insights to share.

First Sunday of Lent

21st February 2021

Collect

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ fasted forty days in the wilderness, and was tempted as we are, yet without sin: give us grace to discipline ourselves in obedience to your Spirit; and, as you know our weakness, so may we know your power to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: 1 Peter 3.18-22

Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you – not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Gospel: Mark 1.9-15

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.' And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him. Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

Post Communion

Lord God, you have renewed us with the living bread from heaven; by it you nourish our faith, increase our hope, and strengthen our love: teach us always to hunger for him who is the true and living bread, and enable us to live by every word that proceeds from out of your mouth; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

Without a doubt, everyone's life has changed in many ways since this time last year. If it hasn't changed, you must have been living on a self-contained desert island with no access to outside communication! For one reason or another, our awareness of time has also been affected. Slowness of time, frustration that certain 'good times' have been missed and the presence of 'bad times' in the news are all shared experiences. In a nutshell, we are all changed people.

But what might that mean? Are we angry people, are we impatient people, are we despairing people? Has our faith in our fellow human beings and in human nature been diminished or enriched? Has our faith been challenged? Have we begun to think of life differently because of the limitations of our ability to move about and fill up our time with all sorts of activities?

Here we are for our second Lent under the Covid restrictions. We have been here before and so we hold on to our traditions, our worship, our reflections and prayers until we meet again face to face.
