# **REFLECTIONS**

Ashamed of Jesus?

In every age the Christian faces the challenge that is expressed in our Gospel reading this week, and in our Baptism services.

'Do not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified...'

Every week we affirm our faith as we recite the words of the Creed, but it is one thing to do so in church [or on Zoom nowadays!] it can be more challenging to 'own' our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ when as a youngster we are in school, or as an adult in an office or a shop, and for some it isn't always easy to do so at home. The apostle Peter knew from a painful experience of a threefold denial that we can easily be caught off guard, as it were. Later in one of his letters he wrote,

'in your hearts honour Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defence to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you, yet do so with gentleness and respect.'

1 Peter 3.15

I was very struck by a story that I heard many years ago of a young boy called John who was about 12 years old, but who had become very self-conscious of his mother's badly scarred and twisted hands. In earlier times he had brought his friends home to play but on becoming more aware of her hands' he stopped inviting them home. His father noticed this and questioned why the friends no longer came but the embarrassed boy couldn't say. His father perceived the problem and thought that time had come to tell him that when John was a toddler he had pushed away a fireguard when his mother's back was turned and his clothes had caught fire. He screamed and his mother had raced in and rescued him. At great cost to her hands. On hearing this John went away quietly. Next week he invited his friends in again, and this time he said to them, 'Look at my mother's hands, she burnt them because she loved me so much.....'

Every now and then, sometimes quite unexpectedly, we may find ourselves questioned about our faith- and we don't always know what to say! Let us pray for each other that if and when these times come, we may at least not be ashamed of the Lord, but quietly and with respect, show our love and gratitude to the one 'who loved me and gave himself for me' [Paul's words in Galatians 2.20]

# Welcome to our services today Second Sunday of Lent 28<sup>th</sup> February 2021

### Collect

Almighty God, you show to those who are in error the light of your truth, that they may return to the way of righteousness: grant to all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's religion, that they may reject those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Romans 4.13-25

The promise that Abraham would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations'). Abraham believed in the presence of the God who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations,' according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him,' were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in God who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Gospel: Mark 8.31-38

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. 33But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

### **Post Communion**

Almighty God, you see that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves: keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Back in 1678, John Bunyan wrote 'Pilgrim's Progress' a famous allegory of the Christian life. Bunyan had his own lockdown for a time in Bedford Jail. Some of us during Lent this year are considering together 'What on earth is the church for?' and I found myself musing about a possible modern allegory of church life. It concerns football. [I have probably lost more than half my readers already!] We have a coach in our Lord Jesus Christ, a coach who signs on new players who turn to him and accept his terms of forgiveness and a new life after repentance and putting their trust in him.
