Mothering Sunday

Collect

God of compassion, whose Son Jesus Christ, the child of Mary, shared the life of a home in Nazareth, and on the cross drew the whole human family to himself: strengthen us in our daily living that in joy and in sorrow we may know the power of your presence to bind together and to heal; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Exodus 2:1-10

A man from the house of Levi went and married a Levite woman. The woman conceived and bore a son; and when she saw that he was a fine baby, she hid him for three months. When she could hide him no longer she got a papyrus basket for him, and plastered it with bitumen and pitch; she put the child in it and placed it among the reeds on the bank of the river. His sister stood at a distance, to see what would happen to him. The daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river, while her attendants walked beside the river. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her maid to bring it. When she opened it, she saw the child. He was crying, and she took pity on him, 'This must be one of the Hebrews' children,' she said. Then his sister said to Pharaoh's daughter, 'Shall I go and get you a nurse from the Hebrew women to nurse the child for you?' Pharaoh's daughter said to her, 'Yes.' So the girl went and called the child's mother. Pharaoh's daughter said to her, 'Take this child and nurse it for me, and I will give you your wages.' So the woman took the child and nursed it. When the child grew up, she brought him to Pharaoh's daughter, and she took him as her son. She named him Moses, 'because,' she said, 'I drew him out of the water.'

Gospel: John 19. 25b-27

Standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman, here is your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

Post Communion

Loving God, as a mother feeds her children at the breast you feed us in this sacrament with the food and drink of eternal life: help us who have tasted your goodness to grow in grace within the household of faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

Today, as I am sure you all know, is Mothering Sunday. Note: "Mothering Sunday" not the Americanism "Mother's Day". Looking back to my childhood, and adolescent days in the Congregational Church, I don't think that the day was marked in any grand way - it may have had an honourable mention in passing, but no more. In the Church of England it is a special day, and may be this has something to do with our different theologies in respect of "Mother Church".

Mothering Sunday is always the mid Sunday in Lent when apprentices and girls in service were allowed to go home. It was a time when Lenten discipline was relaxed, and it was sometimes known as "Refreshment Sunday". Simnel cakes were made (a sort of fruit cake coloured with saffron and marzipan).

In the Book of Common Prayer, the Gospel reading for the day is the feeding of the five thousand, and the epistle reading (BCP) refers to Jerusalem which is "Mother of us all."

Whatever our theology, and from whatever tradition we come, we can all give thanks for our mothers. My mother died at the age of 96 and so I was very fortunate to have her for so long. I know that most of you, like me, have mothers who have joined "the communion of saints". But we can still give prayerful thanks for our mothers who cared for us, fed us, protected us and loved us. For those of you who still have a mother, this day, in particular, is the day when we can express our love for them. Today we give thanks for the care and love, which we have received.

Today we can also give thanks for the care and nourishment we have received from the church.
