Collect

Lord of all power and might, the author and giver of all good things: graft in our hearts the love of your name, increase in us true religion, nourish us with all goodness, and of your great mercy keep us in the same; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Ephesians 2.11-22

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision' a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling-place for God.

Gospel: Mark 6.30-34,53-56

The apostles returned from their mission. They gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things. When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

Post Communion

Lord God, whose Son is the true vine and the source of life, ever giving himself that the world may live: may we so receive within ourselves the power of his death and passion that, in his saving cup, we may share his glory and be made perfect in his love; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

REFLECTIONS - JOHN RISBY

In our recent Gospel readings in Mark we have seen how the response to our Lord's public ministry grew rapidly. Crowds followed him everywhere bringing the sick and longing to hear more of his teaching. It was an exciting time for Jesus and the twelve -and it was also exhausting. 'so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat...' The disciples had just been entrusted to go in pairs on their first mission and were longing to tell Jesus how it had gone, and they and he had just heard the news that King Herod had executed John the Baptist. A lot to think about.....and still the crowds....

The Lord had tried to take the twelve away to a secluded place to eat, to debrief, to rest and to pray. Still the crowds.....the crowds had twigged where they were going and, in fact, arrived at the intended quiet spot first. In his compassion the Lord began teaching once again, and at the end of the day he had provided the 5000 with sustenance for their journey home. And leaving the disciples for a time, Jesus went up into a mountain -and there he prayed.

There are times in our lives when we find everything seems to get on top of us....we have busy days [good days often!] but days that leave us feeling very tired and longing for rest. And these can be times when coincidentally our minds can be in turmoil because there are decisions or problems that require attention. As they say like buses they all come at once! We could say that that is life with its ebbs and flows of activities and challenges. Our Gospel reading reminds us there will always be more to be done than we can do, just as it was in our Lord's time. He saw the crowds and had compassion, but he could only meet the needs of so many. In seeking to pray with his Father, our Lord sought to align himself with the Father's will, and to deal with situations as they arose. In our busy, restless, anxious age, we [and I speak to myself here!] we would do well to remember the God-given sabbath principle of one day's rest in seven, and the value of a daily quiet time with our Lord reading his word and responding in prayer-praise and petition.

PRAYER FOR THIS WEEK

O Sabbath rest by Galilee, O calm of hills above, where Jesus knelt to share with Thee, the silence of eternity, interpreted by love. Drop thy still dews of quietness till all our strivings cease; take from our souls the strain and stress, and let our ordered lives confess the beauty of thy peace. Amen
